
Sense of place is also used to describe the distinctiveness or unique character of particular localities and regions.



each other and was inspired




Because I have always liked to record life in the form of illustrations, I chose this method to create a series of portrait illustrations as my final artwork.




















The following black and white images were captured in the village of Wagrain and on the footpath between Kleinarl and Tappenkarsee.
























Gaining a new hobby which subsequently changed my creative practice. Austria was an incredible opportunity which will forever be an experience with a special place in my heart.


During my first ever hike to

of breathtaking beauty.


This inspired me to create two screen prints. The prints are the view overlooking lake Tappenkarsee and beyond.


# **Hugh Harwood**

Hugh has also developed many socially engaged collaborative art projects (with a diverse range of people, particularly within a health context) that explore through various media, issues of memory and identity.










